Its mission is to draw Christians and churches together as part of a broader movement to connect faith and money, equipping people to make changes with their own money and to speak out for changes in the way banks, businesses and the tax system operate in pursuit of a fairer, greener world. We would surely agree with them that in these difficult times

such a movement is more needed than ever.

Do take a look at the website: it includes resources about banking and pensions and the connections between money and the environmental crisis – how to choose a more ethical bank, how to be a more ethical consumer and more.



As JustMoney points out,

"a church community of 40 households has a collective 'spending' power of £1 million every year to shape a fairer, greener world (based on an average household income of £25,000). Together, we can have an impact."

A SPECIAL THANK YOU

I'm Nick, me and Joe Coury-Reid recorded a soundtrack for a production of David Copperfield at Heath Street on Monday. I wanted to thank you profusely for allowing us to use the church and equipment at such short notice and for such a long shift. Me and Joe in retrospect realised that the soundtrack would have been impossible to

record without the facilities and space you provided us. I am so grateful.

The production is currently in rehearsal, and curtain goes up next Wednesday! The church will be sure to get a special thank you in the official programme.

OUR STONEWORK PROJECT

STAGE 1 COMPLETE

Stage 1 is by far the biggest, and if you have come to church or even just walked past since the scaffolding came down you will know how dazzlingly clean and crisp it now looks.

Stage 2 hasn't a timetable yet, but it will tackle ground-level detail and final cleaning at street level. We didn't dare spend more than the £204,000 it has cost so far, but that has meant that the detail which can be tackled from a small scaffolding tower can be done once we have raised a bit more. We have raided our reserves to do as much as we have so far. It was safety considerations that necessitated the work, but the aesthetic improvement, taking us back to our founders' vision for the building, has been quite wonderful and made a significant difference to Heath Street.

To help us with affording the work this year (and drawing on our precious reserves that bit less) we have had some really generous gifts towards the eyewatering costs. Up to mid-November we

have been given £29,240 in donations and have claimed nearly £4,000 in Gift Aid from HMRC. There are about three dozen specific individuals in the list of donors and lots more who gave in joint fundraising efforts.

We have been blessed by many donors - individuals and families who attend services at the church; those who visit for music; people who have organised concerts to raise money for us or who have given a bit more than the price of a concert ticket; the congregations who also worship in our building - Korean and Brazilian; and friends and family of our local people. There have been welcome donations from overseas, from people who used to worship with us but are now scattered to the four winds. We have had donations from the Netherlands and Germany, Canada and the USA. We know there is at least one generous gift in the pipeline too.

The government has done its bit too, as well as Gift Aid. We have been fortunate in



being able to reclaim nearly £32,000 from the government as a refund for our VAT on the work done. This is a special programme to support repairs and improvements in listed buildings, not guaranteed, but happily there was enough money for us.

If you are one of the people who have already given – heartfelt thanks. If you haven't yet helped us, please will you consider giving something? Any more funds that come in will be hugely welcome and will relieve the pressure on our income in covering all the other costs we have to run our many different activities and keep the building

warm and functioning.

EWAN KING ACCEPTS AWARD FOR HEATH STREET'S OLDTIME NURSERY



At a 17 November event celebrating more than 30 years of work by of the School of Infant Mental Health. Ewan King (and Group) received the "Parent Infant Advancement Award" in recognition and appreciation for promoting parent infant well-being through music to parents and babies. The Award was presented to Ewan by Dr Stella Acquarone, founder and principal of the Parent Infant Centre, for Oldtime Nursery, the interactive drop-in music session for babies, toddlers and older children accompanied by their parents or carers held every Tuesday (10:00 - 11:00am) and Thursday (10:30 - 11:30am). The celebration was held in London's Freud Museum. Over the past 30 years the School of Infant Mental Health has trained many scores of Parent Infant Psychoanalytic Psychotherapists. As well as in the UK, the School's trainees and graduates can now be found elsewhere in Europe, and in Africa, Asia, Australia, and North and South America.

After the applause, Stella said that

"Ewan has a wonderful group -- apart from the other very many things that he has -- for mothers and fathers and carers and their babies...and I have sent many extremely depressed mothers to that group on Tuesdays and Thursdays and he and his group of friends, who are extremely good musicians, sing and play all the instruments in all the forms and in all the ways and jump around and it's so jolly and so full of life. It's really worthwhile. Thank you very much! Ewan is the minister of Heath Street Baptist Church, and it has a fantastic music programme."

TRAIN DELAYED? TRY PLAYING A CHURCH ORGAN INSTEAD

The screening of the film "Organ Stops" a year or so ago at Heath Street attracted a big crowd to hear how threatened church organs are and how Martin Renshaw and colleagues in the charity Pipe Up are rescuing good



organs, pipe by numerous pipe, and in some cases successfully finding new homes for them.

The latest venture from Pipe Up is to outdo the railway stations offering a piano to play, by installing a church pipe organ in London Bridge station, available to passing musicians.

It originally came from the United Reformed Church in Whetstone that closed as a church in 2020 and is now a school building. It was made by the prolific organ maker Henry Jones, who was active from the 1850s and even exhibited at the International Exhibition of 1862.

Just like the free pianos, the pipe organ is free to play, although there are a few instructions for users, as it's a bit more complicated than a piano, as our newest church organist Frida King knows well. It is in the side tunnels between London Bridge mainline station and the Underground.


